

Marking Fiat Lux's final countdown on Hobson Street is "History". This programme continues the format of 1998's "Hungry Eyes" series, featuring one artist working in the window and one in the gallery space. "History" will boast the talents of Yvonne Todd and Geoff Heath, Lorna Bailey and David Scott, and last but not least Daniel Malone and Paula Coulthard.

This epic programme kicks off on April fools day with "Obsession" by Megan Dunn and "The Dark Side of the Moon" by Dylan Rainforth, a pinch and a punch for the first of the month. Megan's recent collages and video works play with waifs and wraiths gathering Moss. The beauty myth rears its ugly head yet again with this sobering look at "The Gaze" and the 1990's species of Supermodel. Megan's metamorphoses stress 'The Unbearable Lightness of Being' a breed apart. Somewhere between love and madness lies Obsession...

Dylan is lost in our space again, this time with lunar lunacy. Following in the fine tradition of diorama art is "The Dark Side of the Moon" but this display won't be just another brick in the wall coming from the installation artist who dared to suggest a relationship between a shower curtain and two Big Ben meat pies. Seeing is believing.

Every day is like Sunday,

"Sunnynook" steers us through suburbia, the signs and symbols of life in a cultural cul de sac appear as though glimpsed through the car window on the dreaded family weekend drive. Behind the mundane veneer of an abandoned exercycle marooned on the patio, spartan unfurnished rooms and banal nick knacks is an air of stagnation, degradation and decline, a sense of pathos and the pathetic. The works engage a strange paradox: abnormally normal, aesthetic and yet anti-aesthetic, drolly humorous and oppressively depressing, serious yet whimsical.

Geoff Heath and Yvonne Todd tackle photo journalism with panache, producing documentary without the dogma. There are no people depicted and yet the images are evocative of a way of life, an ethos and a psyche - priorities, aspirations, tastes, mores, and fantasy's are conveyed through the trophies that people covet and swaddle themselves with. 'Just what is it that makes today's homes so different, so appealing?', 'Sunnynook' examines Pop that's lost it's fizz, capturing the built in obsolescence which erodes the initial glamour and status of prized creature comforts.

The mysterious public evacuation reads like a metaphor for domestic alienation a la 'The Quiet Earth', and the dehumanising effect of the suburb's smothering still life. The Television is the one eyed baby sitter, a channel of escape into an other worldly realm outside the brick and tile bungalows of the bourgeois ghetto...'Don't you cry tonight, theres a heaven above you baby'.

'Sunnynook' is an amateur anthropological survey of the suburbian condition, like a massed 'This is your life' - neither a fashionable gloss nor a venomous expose. The prosaic, quotidian, and ordinary become symbolic, like Totems or fetishes, which read in relation to one another, as though the big picture of a subliminal jigsaw puzzle is taking shape, but it remains hard to see the forest for the trees.

'Reality Bites'. Belying the cheery optimism implicit in the title, 'Sunnynook's' suburban by-way's seem bathed in the watery gloaming of an arrested sunset - Don't let the sun go down on me'

Put simply, 'Sunnynook' is a must see.

If you fail to plan, you plan to fail...

David Scott's 'Retirement Plan' is an apt title for the penultimate exhibition at Fiat Lux on Hobson Street, and continues our recent precedent of fine photography.

Scott's 'Exploded View' at Fiat Lux in 1997 literally blew up colour images on a photocopier, forming enlarged pixilated grids, 'Retirement Plan' changes suit featuring a body of new, more modestly scaled black and white works. Playing his cards close to his chest all we can reveal is that these works include evening landscapes and architectural studies, but the title paints its own picture evoking the fiscal euthanasia of New Zealand's twilight generation. The recent television advertising campaign for Superannuation reflects an absence of Government responsibility, capturing the venal logic that liquidates personal assets, pulling the rug out from under arthritic feet.

Lorna Bailey plucks our recent rose motif from the Fiat Lux letterhead for her window dressing installation. Baileys site specific art highlights properties already synonymous with her environments, a trompe l'oeil allusion to 3 dimensional space rendered in 2D, as evidenced in her characteristic linear drawings made with plastic coated cane. Bailey alters the typical repertoire of site specific art, by working with The Fiat Lux rose, a symbol of the gallery identity rather than a physical aspect of the space. Paper roses seem so real, like the withering night blooms from 'Flowers in the Attic', a metaphor for lost youth and innocence, 'Could it be a faded rose from days gone by?'

The rose serves as a momento mori of the 'History' series and Fiat Lux's current incarnation as they drift towards the sweet hereafter. Make haste to experience the final days of the original Fiat Lux on Hobson Street, the end is nigh, so its now or never...

Do not go gently into that good night, Rage, rage against the dying of the light,

Ashes to ashes, funk to funky. Welcome to Fiat Lux's final exhibition at 160 Hobson Street. Our most humble thanks to everyone who has been involved with Fiat Lux over the past three years; it wouldn't have been possible without your commitment and support. We love our audience! Our next location is due to be finalised at the end of this month when we receive the result of our Creative New Zealand application so don't call us we'll call you.

Genetic engineering is the horror fodder of the modern industrial Gothic. Evolution is no longer a grab bag lottery from the primordial soup of the global gene pool but an exacting science attempting to achieve eugenic perfection. Coulthard utilises her trademark materials, bone, leather, latex /rubber, to create Modern primitive ju ju's and fetishes, escapees from the commercial confines of the Xena prop department. Coulthard's prosthetic aesthetics examine the hubris of Western medical omnipotence and the moral mayhem created by such advancements as plastic hips and artificial heart valves, pig organ donors and human ears grafted onto lab mice. The bones in 'Soup' evoke the dawn of civilisation scene from '2001: A Space Odessy' with a greater emphasis on mortal bondage, our culture of dominance and submission dramatised by chimps as gimps...'Let's play master and servant'. In Coulthard's birds nest eggs mimic the alarms of cellular phones, a commentary on the urban naturalisation of our fellow species, another drop in the well of colonial assimilation.

It's 'From Here to Eternity' as the tsunami wave of millennial paranoia overwhelms the canoodling couple of perennial new age optimism. Daniel Malone provides more signz of the times with his window AD INFINITUM, inspired by growing anxiety over the Y2K problem and the dd/mm/yy format to blame, especially in literature addressed to small businesses. Will those three little letters Y.2.K. spell Armageddon for human civilisation? It's better safe than sorry so 'I'm looking at the man in the mirror, I'm asking him to change his ways.' A PARTI LIKE ITZ 1999 is to this show what BACK TO THE FUTURE was to the first show at Fiat Lux by Malone in 1996. Opening nite visitors are invited to move on from the gallery, again to the site of a gallery from days gone by, and partake in a free meal served from a newly reopened business. 'In the mirror of my mind. Time after time, I see reflections of you and me. Reflections of the way we used to be...'

Life will find a way... Fint Sux.
